The PRAASA roundtable on hospitals was attended by members from California, Idaho and Hawaii. It was inspiring to hear about the work being done in other areas and heartening to recognize that the same unevenness is being experienced throughout the Pacific Region and thus, I assume, in areas not represented there.

One of the clearest messages expressed by the members present was the necessity to work with CPC, PI and other elements within our service structure in order to carry the message to those in hospitals.

A second point of discussion was a brief classification of the kinds of patients we experience: Those whose drinking has brought them to the institution, those who are currently in the fellowship and are suffering from a non-alcohol-related illness, and those who are experiencing long-term or terminal care. While each of these categories requires different services, all can benefit from the solution on which we all agree!

Aloha Hawaii Area 17,

The Hawaiian Island Conference of Young People in AA (HICYPAA) Advisory Committee would like to take this opportunity to inform Area 17 about our purpose and upcoming events.

Young People's Groups in Alcoholics Anonymous began appearing around 1945 in Los Angeles, Cleveland and Philadelphia, and now they can be found all across North America. In 1958, a meeting of young AA's from across the US and Canada started what is now the International Conference of Young People in Alcoholics Anonymous (ICYPAA), and it has met on an annual basis ever since. At the 1960 AA convention, Bill W. noted that the age of new members was much lower than when he and Dr. Bob founded AA 25 years earlier. In a letter to ICYPAA dated June 15, 1989, Bill wrote "...in recent years I have found nothing for greater inspiration than the knowledge that A.A. of tomorrow will be safe, and certainly magnificent, in the keeping of you who are the younger generation of A.A. today."


HICYPAA was founded in Hawaii in 1996 for the purpose of providing a setting for a local annual celebration of sobriety among young people in AA. Since its inception, a growing group of people, who at first would not consider themselves as "young people," have become regular attendees. The number of young people suffering from alcoholism who turn to AA for help is growing, and HICYPAA helps to carry AA's message of recovery to alcoholics of all ages. This meeting provides an opportunity for young AA's from all over Hawaii and the world to come together to share their experience, strength, and hope as members of Alcoholics Anonymous. AA members who attend a HICYPAA return home better prepared to receive young people who come to AA looking for a better way of life.

HICYPAA provides visible evidence that large numbers of young people are achieving a lasting and comfortable sobriety in Alcoholics Anonymous. The three legacies of AA – Recovery, Unity, and Service – are the backbone of HICYPAA just as they are throughout AA. HICYPAA has a history as an established AA conference. It contributes to the AA General Service Office, as well as to Area17 and the Hawaii Intergroups. HICY-PAA and its attendees are also committed to reaching out to the newcomer, and to involvement in every other facet of AA service. Newcomers are shown, by people their own age, that using AA principles in their daily lives & getting involved in AA service can have a significant impact on a lasting & comfortable sobriety.

Each year a new host island is selected through a bidding process that is a part of the annual event. HICY-PAA is excited to announce that Oahu has received the bid and will host this year's event which has been tentatively scheduled for October, 2011.

We recognize and appreciate your role in supporting young people in Alcoholics Anonymous. Thank you.
