This woman found exactly what she didn't know she was looking for, because the group was there!

Hello, my name is Becky and I am an alcoholic. The reason I came to be here is quite mysterious. One day, I was walking my dog down the bike path. I saw from a distance a friend of mine in a large group. She looked so happy as she gave someone a hug. I went over to talk to her as the group was just breaking up. She encouraged me to come to the next very early meeting at AA. Well, I did, but not because I was an alcoholic; but because I wanted what the group had. My nights and even some days were still filled with drinking. I had quite given up. I was lonely, sad, mad and discouraged.

My friend didn't give up on me, so I went to meetings, mostly because I like what they had. It took almost 3 months of being in denial before it dawned on me: maybe I could be an alcoholic. I've lost so many people in my life and I was afraid that I'd lose more. There is, I believe, the sunlight of the spirit. It was the spirit that brought me to AA. You know, when the light is just right it filters through the trees. It was if my brother's spirit was drawing me to the special place. Now I can celebrate life and not be drowned by the deaths of my best friend and brother, who died from drugs and alcohol. Now I can move on, finally, and I'm not alone anymore! My name is Clifford and I am an alcoholic. Jim D, our area Mynah Bird chair, has been asking for articles for the Mynah Bird, so I finally decided to submit one.

I love the name of our discussion group: "Pie before Principles." It was coined by one of our district officers. We meet the third Monday of every month at 5:30 PM for pie (French Apple) and "talk story." At 6 PM we start our discussion.

A year or so ago, Maui's District 5 started an informal get-together with the GSR's of District 5 to familiarize them with the duties and responsibilities of their position. This came about as a result of an area inventory assembly a few years ago. We have former and current area officers and former and current district officers in attendance along with the GSR's.

I know I felt totally lost and confused at my first assembly when I became a GSR. We have hope that our Pie Before Principals meeting will help our new GSR's be a little more comfortable.

Our format is very informal as we discuss what the GSR's want to discuss. Here are some of the discussions we have had at the request of the GSR's:

Reading portions of the AA Service Manual

Discussing upcoming area assemblies

Reading the Concepts (this has started beginning December 2015).

Personally, I find this exciting and informational. This is one way I am able to share my experience strength and hope related to being of service in General Service. I have also found a new energy in reading our literature. I have picked up our Service Manual and began reading it again, especially the 12 Concepts. As a past district and area officer I tried to make it comfortable to those that were unfamiliar with our process. A Place to Call Home

My home group is Kehei Morning Serenity. We meet six mornings a week at a little green church across the street from the beach in North Kehei. I attend other meetings on a fairly regular basis, but I consider KMS home.

I first attended Kehei Morning Serenity on my first sober vacation. I chose the meeting because it was walking distance from the condominium where we were staving and also because it was at 7 AM. I could easily get to the meeting and I attended an early morning meeting at home and the early hour left plenty of time to enjoy Maui for the first time sober! It was love at first sight. I attended Kihei Morning Serenity regularly on that first visit to Maui and that meeting was always one of the highlights of our subsequent visits to Maui. I found myself wishing that my meetings back home did things the KMS way! Fast forward 10 years - we moved to Maui in January 2007. People asked me if I

was crazy moving across the ocean to a new place. Granted, we were moving to Maui, but we were moving away from the familiar – we had lived in the same town in California for over 30 years. I knew differently – we were moving to "family." So what is it about Kihei Morning Serenity that makes it a special home group? At any given meeting, there will be people with less than 30 days sobriety and people with over 30 years of sobriety. Service is very important.

Because we meet six mornings a week, there are many service opportunities. We have 30 service positions with sobriety requirements ranging from 30 days to two years. I love the fact that a person with over 20 years sobriety will take a coffee maker position. Each morning of the week has a special theme – Monday is devoted to beginners, Tuesday is the steps, Wednesday is big book, Thursday is Grapevine, Friday is sponsorship and literature; Saturday is step 10. All of our meetings are literaturebased. We talk about the solution and we laugh a lot.

We have a home group meeting once a month. We have had issues where the group has been sharply divided, but thanks to the traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous we have survived as a group and have become stronger. We have many visitors – some first-time visitors and some who return year after vear. We welcome them and usually ask them to share. When I was a visitor, I was asked to chair a meeting. When I tried to explain that I was a visitor, the secretary said, "When you share, you become part of the group." Like many alcoholics, I never felt a part of anything. I felt a part of Kihei Morning Serenity that day! Karen N

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My Experience from the Crossing: Off the Bucket List!

It's very hard for me to put into words what being able to participate in the Crossing to Molokai means to me. When I realized I would be able to go, I hesitated momentarily. Camping and I aren't really very familiar with each other. Going would mean I would be sleeping on the ground. I was certain it would be a little different experience than sleeping on my very comfortable bed at home. But then I remembered this truly was on my Bucket List!!! And, I'd never been to Molokai before. When I first heard about the Crossing around 2007, I wanted to experience it. What better way to achieve unity? I could be a part of reaching out to alcoholics on fairly remote islands in the middle of the Pacific. Back in 2007 I made plans to go to one of the Crossings to Lanai but my flight from the Big Island was canceled the night before I was leaving. This time, I was prepared. The airline assured me they rarely canceled flights anymore. I had my tent, sleeping bag and pad that I had bought back in 2007 for my first attempt at a Crossing. Never mind that I hadn't used it since its purchase. I checked for holes and practiced setting it up and all was good.

My flight left early in the morning and I was able to see the beautiful Hawaiian Islands from the air - Kahoolawe, Haleakala, the pali of Maui, Lanai and finally Molokai. The next two days were packed full of meetings, great food and fellowship. We camped at a church across from the historic Kapuaiwa Coconut Grove. The AAs from Molokai welcomed us with open arms and the Crossing committee did a great job planning it all. On Saturday we went to the other side of the island for a meeting, hike, swim and a view of Kalaupapa from the cliffs. There were more meetings when we returned to our camping spot. I left Saturday evening with my heart full of gratitude - for AA and the fellowship, for being able to participate in passing on my experience, strength and hope and for witnessing AA at work.
