
When Alcoholics Anonymous was new, and in the "flying blind" stage, members went to Dr. Bob and Bill W. for solutions to problems. As A.A. grew and accumulated experience, strength and hope, two key decisions have helped us survive and flourish. We print literature to help us pass on our message. We have a service structure that gives us a way to communicate and make decisions for A.A. At the first General Service Conference, the responsibility for A.A. was transferred from our founders to A.A. as a whole.

The 69th General Service Conference was a weeklong meeting that allowed us to inspect our General Service Office, and ask questions. We heard annual reports from the General Service Board, A.A. World Services and A.A. Grapevine, Inc. During the week we met by committee, discussed the agenda items submitted throughout the year, and met as a body of 135 members. We listened, asked questions, voted on recommendations and made decisions we hope are for the good of Alcoholics Anonymous.

We were given two opportunities to tour of the General Service Office housed at 475 Riverside Drive, NYC. When we stepped out of the elevator we were greeted with The Serenity Prayer in many languages. It warmed my heart to see it written in Hawaiian.

At the conference, tables displayed our literature in French, Spanish, English as well as other languages. Printing the Big Book in 71 languages is no small accomplishment. We aren't done though. 21 translations are currently in process, some of which are revisions.





General Service Board

We can all keep up to date through Box 459, and information accessible at aa.org. In the role as good service leaders (Concept IX), here are seven goals our **General Service Board** keeps in mind while working:

- 1. Model inclusivity and acceptance in accordance with the Third Tradition.
- 2. Work on relationships with professionals be friendly with our friends.
- 3. Effective communication.
- 4. Identify new places and audiences to bring the A.A. message of hope.
- 5. Improve internal communications among the three boards.
- 6. Act as a role model in promoting the importance of our tradition of anonymity as expressed in the Eleventh and Twelfth Traditions.
- Financial health it is largely up to A.A.
 members to provide the seventh traditions
 contributions. GSO finds ways to communicate
 the work GSO does as a result of those
 contributions.



Alcoholics Anonymous World Services

We are a not for profit corporation with 9 directors who are responsible for oversight of the General Service Board, and are elected by our 21 trustees.

<u>Group Services</u> - In 2018, 1,641 new groups in the U.S. and 91 new groups in Canada were listed with G.S.O., who corresponds with each groups' GSR.

International- 25th World Service Meeting took place in Durban, South Africa, with 72 delegates from 45 countries. Trustees and G.S.O. management also attended regional and national conventions in 8 other countries.

G.S. O.'s A.A. Website – In 2018 aa.org received an estimated total of 15,254,461 visits, an increase of 14% from 2017. Approximately 431 Emails were received and responded to. New features include YouTube Information and FAQ pages, Meeting Guide and "A.A. Around the World."

<u>Forums and Other Events</u>- help provide information about G.S.O. and help staff gather local experience.

<u>Financial</u> – Our income come for two sources: Seventh Tradition from the fellowship and from literature sales. Of the known groups, approximately 41.3% sent seventh traditions contributions. These contributions cover 73.4% of the annual cost. The remainder of the cost is covered by profits from literature sales.

A.A. World Services -

International Convention - in Detroit in July 2-5, 2020 Information Technology - the New Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system will be an update to G.S.O.s software system.

Intellectual Property, Administrative Services, Daily Reflections video project and last but not least; Service Material - In addition to books, pamphlets & audio materials shipped daily, **902,000** Big Books sold and **55,330** eBooks sold.

<u>Archives</u> – Finished approximately 1,600 requests for information and research, and accessioned over 375 new items.

Publishing – The Big Book is available in 71 languages. 265 licenses to reproduce and distribute items of translated copyrighted literature were issued or renewed as compared to 73 in 2017. Individual pieces of literature distributed included 4,746,832 in English, 328,068 in Spanish, and112,002 in French.

Our Great Responsibility: A selection of Bill W.'s General Service Conference Talks 1951-1971 has been printed in French, Spanish and English.

<u>G.S.O.</u> and <u>Staff Operations</u>- At the end of 2018 G.S.O. had 91 employees: 38 administrative, A.A. staff, supervisory and exempt professionals and 53 supporting personnel.

In 2018, G.S.O. welcomed more than 3,000 visitors and guests, who often attended the open A.A. meeting held at 11:00am on Friday, and toured the office.


A.A. Grapevine, Inc.


The AA Grapevine is known as our meeting in print. AAGV also publishes Spanish-language content in La Viña magazine and related books, CD and audio formats, as well as a Spanish-language web pages. GVs average monthly print circulation is 66,857 and GV Online averages 3,390 subscribers., Bimonthly circulation for LV is 9,635. GV is selfsupporting through subscriptions. As intended, LV continues to be a service piece, with shortfalls covered by contributions. The Carry the Message project encourages us to sponsor subscriptions. This invaluable Twelve Step tool helps us, and helps others as we pass in on in print, and through the stories found online in our GV archives. GV also continue to prink books and related projects. Al these efforts help us to convey the "Voices of A.A."



Trustees also reported on the work being done by Archives, Audit, Compensation, Cooperation with Professional Community/Treatment and Accessibilities, GSC, and International committees.

- Considered the 1986 Advisory Action and asked that it be re-implemented. (If a committee recommendation does not receive 2/3ds vote, but has a majority of votes, it become a suggestion and be duly noted in the conference report)
- Noting that a presentation on Equitable Workload Distribution was scheduled, the Committee requested a plan or progress report be brought to the 70th GSC.

PUBLIC INFORMATION

- <u>Recommend</u> the trustees' Committee on PI develop a plan to produce video shorts based on current A.A. Pamphlets. **PASSED**

What I Saw, Heard and Felt



Throughout the week, I was moved by the work that is done, and the manner in which we conduct ourselves.

At the Inform the Delegate Assembly we discussed one-time bequests to A.A. Mary, GSO's Staff Coordinator talks with families who are grateful that A.A. helped their family member. She is tactful and kind while explaining that we don't memorialize A.A. members. Contributions from members who have passed on will help alcoholics, just as their family member did while alive.

Several people who work at G.S.O. are nonalcoholics who want to work for a company that helps people. They are highly competent and could work elsewhere, but prefers to be a part of what we do. The language of the heart speaks to nonalcoholics as well as alcoholics.

Racy in Public Information explained outreach efforts online. Technology offers new ways to reach more people. We can use the internet to help alcoholics searching for a solution.

Clement, in Communication Services explained when he started, the aa.org website was the only thing on his workload. Now, he also helps us utilize the advances made in technology. There is a lot of information about A.A. on the internet. The work at G.S.O. is so A.A. has an online presence as well.

We want people to have opportunities to hear our message from us.

Patrick, our Conference Coordinator had been in contact with me since I was elected. He addressed any concern or question I had prior to arriving in NYC, and during the conference. Great people work for us.




During the General Service Conference, I felt like a worker among workers, and friend among friends. Whether in committee, or in the whole assembly, working through the agenda items was an amazing experience. People came prepared, and although we were kind and considerate, we also addressed the items that took longer to work through with the same tact as the easier items. Everyone's input was welcomed and heard.

First year delegates can be known for being a bit intense and serious. We can't have fun, we have work to do! But second year delegates, and others in the conference know we can get things done and have a little fun as well. Trustees helped us lighten up by inviting us out for ice cream. Imagine 60 of us walking around Times Square, and filling up a dozen or so tables in a restaurant where the wait staff sang in the aisles and on stage before and after serving our ice cream. We laughed and sang along.

During meals I sat with a non-trustee director and a trustee at large. One is originally from Cuba and now lives in Miami, the other is from Canada. Since they seemed to be in their 40s, I was encouraged to see diversity in nationality and age in our trustees. I asked both how it was they came to be trustees. Each described reading the job requirements. Realizing they had the skills, they thought maybe one day when they are older, they might think of serving as trustee. Each persons' sponsor suggested they submit applications. Following interviews, each was asked to serve. The lesson was, if we have the job skills, there is no need to wait until we are 60 or 70 years to be a of service as a trustee.
