Life gets good in sobriety, and I never again want to let the life that AA has given me get in the way of my AA life. For me, service is survival.

I am fortunate to have wonderful mentors who have served before me and a fantastic service sponsor. Without those willing to guide me on this incredible journey, I would be lost. I love you all, and this has been a truly memorable year. However, continually planning months ahead for the future year assemblies and committee meetings causes my life to seem to fly by, which is a scary notion at my age!
