My first attempt at making a list came when I tried to work the steps out of order. Before I had my third step completed, I felt so much guilt and shame I began to write and (the horror!) to send out apology letters to the people I felt I had hurt the most.

What happened ? Since I was trying to be understood rather than to understand, to be forgiven rather than to forgive, I sowed discord and confusion and made a mess of already poor relationships my behavior while drinking had damaged.

I called my sponsor after getting what I judged to be a nasty response to one of these letters. She was gentle but firm with me when she said we would meet as usual and study the Third Step together, and that if I did the Steps in order, I would experience serenity and forgiveness in time. And with the grace of my Higher Power, one day at a time, I would not have to drink. And she equated willingness with readiness, quoting Shakespeare: "The readiness is all."

What happened is that together we read our Big Book, went to 12 +12 Study meetings, and went to meetings together. I accepted guidance from my sponsor and the women on the island. I eventually turned my will and life over to the care of Divine Light and Love *as I understood it* and found the grace to keep working the steps in order.

The best advice my sponsor gave me back then was this: Work Step 8 as if there is no Step 9.

I enjoy Divine grace in my life now, which keeps me able to have the best relations possible with everyone I have the fortune to know and love.

What an honor and privilege it was to present at the North/South Connections Virtual Special Forum last Saturday, July 16th : A.A. in Remote Communities.

There were members from the service structures of Argentina, Canada, Chile and the United States and we shared our experience, strength and hope in extending the hand of A.A. to Remote Communities. Our sessions were interpreted into American Sign Language, French, and Spanish.

Of course I was in tears from the get go when the visual presentation on Google Earth showed all the places in the world we were coming from...even little Kihei, Hawaii!

My topic was "Who are the hidden communities- what are some unexpected opportunities to carry the AA Message?"

I talked about how I had asked myself 2 years ago when I was chair of the Cooperation with the Elder Community committee HOW CAN I CONTINUE MY SERVICE WORK DURING THIS CRAZY COVID time and the answer was for us to reach to the "forgotten" alcoholics WITHIN our fellowship. Our AA friends who perhaps had 30, 40 years sobriety, were maybe very active members at one time, who have helped so many of us as they passed down the AA message for years that now are isolated, hidden, and forgotten...

I talked about how Covid had brought loneliness to many of the old timers that don't feel safe going to the meetings that are starting to resurface, won't reach out, don't "get" the technology of zoom...probably aren't thinking of drinking....and Maybe they are!

I talked about different ways we can help the senior alcoholic stay involved int the fellowship,.

Then I shared how much we do in the CEC committee: brochures, presentations, all the many places we distribute information. I told stories of the senior fairs, senior meetings, how often we reach to more than just seniors. I talked about the huge rise in elder alcoholism in America and how Hawaii started the very first CEC at the Area level

It was so fun to share with other countries what we do. I'm in touch with many of the folks who tuned in with questions. Who would think our little committee could help people from all over the world!

INTO THE WOODS WITH MY HP

I'd like to share some of the experiences I had this summer while hiking 1150 miles on the Pacific Crest Trail. As a longtime clean & sober member of AA, I knew that spending 4 months in the wilderness would require work & planning to keep my program on track. I wouldn't be able to keep up my regular meetings nor would I have much phone service for sober support. Luckily my HP goes everywhere with me but I still needed to load up my toolbox as best I could. So I downloaded AA speaker tapes & Big Book readings and a friend told me about the Grapevine's Podcast. All of these were so helpful!

Thanks to the Meeting Guide App we found some great meetings in the smallest of trail towns. Each town welcomed us, knowing we were sober trekkers, making us feel at home. We met other sober hikers on the trail. One recognized the AA patch on my husband's pack and we were able to have an impromptu meeting with her right on the spot! But the most memorable experience was when 3 of us huddled to say the Serenity Prayer and a hiker from Sweden came over and asked, in his European accent, "excuse me are you in some sort of group?" When we told him who we were he practically jumped up and down with joy saying "so am I! I haven't been to a meeting since coming to America!" We said the Serenity Prayer again, this time with all 4 of us. It was a chicken skin moment.

I'm grateful to be back on Maui and getting back into my routine. I know as long as I keep an open mind and am willing to trust in my Higher Power I can live a happy, joyous & free life.

GSO requests for articles and stories

From the General Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous trustees' Literature Committee

In response to the 2021 General Service Conference Advisory Action requesting the development of a Fifth edition of the book Alcoholics Anonymous, the trustees' Literature Committee is seeking a wide range of A.A. recovery experience of members in the Fellowship.

The trustees' Literature Committee is searching for recovery stories of our members for possible inclusion in the Fifth Edition which are from a broad cross-section of our local communities, all stories are of value. As Bill writes on page 29 of the book Alcoholics Anonymous: "Our hope is that many alcoholic men and women, desperately in need, will see these pages, and we believe that it is only by fully disclosing ourselves and our problems that they will persuaded to say, 'Yes, I am one of them too; I must have this thing.'"

It is the Literature Committee's shared hope that any new stories from our current membership will help future alcoholics to identify and find recovery in the pages of a Fifth edition.

The suggested format for typed manuscripts is 3500 words, double spaced, in 12-point font. Handwritten manuscripts should be approximately 5 to 6 pages. Please include your complete name, address, and email/phone information on the first page of the submission. A copy of your manuscript should be retained for your files.

The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not. Stories will be accepted in English, French or Spanish. If you have any questions, please write to <u>5BBStory@aa.org</u>.
